A Brief History of the Fraser Cultural Centre -

In the early 1930s Lillian Fraser and her sister Margaret, both nurses in the USA, built a summer home here. In 1942, when Lillian Fraser died, she willed their home to the village of Tatamagouche. Initially, domestic science classes were taught here and in 1947 the Red Cross Outpost Hospital opened. Various ailments were treated and many babies were born, often as many as two each day. When a more modern hospital was opened in 1968, the building became Willow Lodge, a home for seniors. In 1981, it was transformed into the present Fraser Cultural Centre named in honour of its benefactor.

Tatamagouche

This area was first known to the Mi'kmaq people as Takumegooch, meaning 'the meeting of the waters'. This is where the French and Waugh rivers meet and then join the harbor. Historical records show other variations and spellings of the name, but it was from the first French Acadian settlers that our village, Tatamagouche received the current spelling of its name.
